'From Ego-System to Eco-System': Extensive Case Study Fashion and Biodiversity

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4. Case study/ topic summary:

The textile, apparel, and fashion sector (TAF) is one of the most socio-ecologically impactful sectors in the global economy. However, the impact of the sector on biodiversity has until now not been studied by academic researchers. This case study analyses the relation between biodiversity loss and the sector and explores potential transformative interventions to promote transformative change for biodiversity. First, the case identified direct and indirect drivers of biodiversity loss connected to the main fashion value chain activities. The TAF industry is a major contributor to biodiversity loss, fuelled by high levels of land-use change, pollution and carbon emissions. The environmentally destructive nature of the industry has been attributed to its linear economic model of infinite growth for maximum profit, growing consumer demand and the self-perpetuating patterns of unsustainable production and consumption. Second, the case analysed the discourses and narratives about fashion and biodiversity present in business-oriented grey-literature. Third, the case analysed the business models of three Italian small and medium fashion enterprises to better understand how they can contribute to transformative change. Finally, the case explored systemic interventions and policies that could help promote transformative change for biodiversity in the sector.

5. Purpose of data collection:

This case studies the connection between the Fashion Value Chain (FVC) and biodiversity loss and explores potential transformations to better prioritise biodiversity. The case supports social actors, companies, and public institutions to integrate biodiversity protection within socio-economic activities, e.g., product design, and transformation of different eco-social relationships with the environment.
